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Prof. dr Nadia Bernaz

Professor of Law & Corporate Justice, Wageningen University

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She is Professor in the Law group at Wageningen University (WUR, the Netherlands), where she is also the Director of the Jean Monnet Centre of Excellence on Corporate Sustainability and Human Rights Law. She is the co-editor-in-chief of the [Business and Human Rights Journal](#).

She holds a PhD in international law from Aix-Marseille University (France).

She is the author of *Business and Human Rights. History, Law and Policy* (Routledge, 2017). She has published numerous academic articles in law and business journals and has been teaching business and human rights since 2010. 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She holds a PhD in International Law from the European University Institute, an LL.M in Private International and Commercial Law from La Sorbonne, and a Dual Bachelor in French and English Law from UPEC

and the University of Sheffield.

Her work focuses on business, human rights, and sustainability, with an emphasis on shaping policy and regulatory developments at national and EU levels, as well as supporting the implementation of human rights and environmental due diligence (HREDD) in practice to foster responsible business conduct. She combines academic research with hands-on advisory and field experience, having contributed to shaping legislation at both national and European levels and to National Action Plans on Business and Human Rights in various countries.

In parallel, she has designed and delivered short courses and executive trainings in Portugal, the United Kingdom, Mozambique, Tunisia, Côte d'Ivoire, Burkina Faso, and Colombia, and has facilitated multi-stakeholder events as well as policy dialogues.

Dr Bright has authored numerous peer-reviewed publications in five languages. She has acted as consultant to governments, international organisations (UNDP, ILO, Council of Europe (CoE)), European institutions (European Commission, European Parliament and the European Agency for Fundamental Rights (FRA)) civil society organizations, and businesses. Notably, she co-authored the [European Commission's study on due diligence requirements in supply chains](#), which laid the foundation for the [EU Corporate Sustainability Due Diligence Directive](#) (CSDDD).



Gabriela Factor

Chief Adviser on Human Rights and Business, Danish Institute for Human Rights

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She is a Chief Adviser on Human Rights and Energy Transition at the Danish Institute for Human Rights based in Copenhagen, Denmark. She is an Environmental, Social and Human Rights Impact specialist who has over 20 years of working experience in international environmental, energy and extractive projects and value chains in Latin America, Europe, South East Asia, Africa and the Arctic. She is the past president of the

International Association for Impact Assessment.

After more than 20 years as a consultant leading and carrying out human rights, social and environmental impact assessments, due diligence and management plans, her current work focus on capacity development, advisory and research for responsible business conduct and policy development, promotion of multistakeholder initiatives and strengthening the role of states for a just energy transition with respect of human rights. She co-authored one chapter for the „[Handbook on Human Rights Impact Assessment](#)“, several academic articles on impact assessment and a „[Study on Business, Environment and Human Rights in Honduras](#)“ with focus on renewable energy. She also represents the Danish Institute for Human Rights in the [International Renewable Energy RBC agreement](#).

Gabriela has extensive hands-on experience with the training of technical staff, governmental officers, financial institution, civil society organizations and indigenous groups in environmental and social issues, gender mainstreaming, energy transition and ESIA's. 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A legal expert specialized in Human Rights & Business and RBC/CSR, with over 20 years of professional experience in public, private, and NGO sectors in various countries, including the Ministry of Justice and the Ministry of Foreign Affairs (Poland), Criminal Justice System and the NSPCC (UK). She completed assignments for the European Parliament, UNDP, OSCE, MFA, and has contributed in an expert capacity and moderated discussions on BHR at the European level and UN level, incl. at the UN Forum on BHR.

A member of the Sustainable Development and CSR Committee, an advisory body to the Minister of Funds and Regional Development, as well as a member of its Working Group on the development of the non-financial reporting. One of the '25 Leaders of Sustainability' in Poland (Women Forbes List 2021).

She regularly conducts training sessions and workshops on BHR for business and other actors, and has taught as Guest Lecturer at postgraduate studies at i.a. Vistula University, Bergen University, and Sopotcka Akademia Nauk Stosowanych.

She is guest Co-Editor of the Special Issue on Business and Human Rights in Eastern Europe for the „*Business and Human Rights Journal*” (Cambridge University Press) and a member of the journal’s Developments in the Filed editorial panel.

Dr Samenta Goethals

Associate Professor in Business & Society, SKEMA Business School
Visiting Fellow, Copenhagen Business School

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Samenta contributes to the *FRONTIERS* project on sustainability due diligence for a just transition. She holds a PhD in Politics from Oxford Brookes University and has developed an interdisciplinary research agenda bridging socio-legal studies, global governance, and organizational studies in the field of business and human rights.

With experience at the cross-road between advocacy research with international NGOs and scholarship, her research focuses on the translation of human rights in business, business responsibility for migrant and refugee labour in the garment industry in Türkiye and Jordan and the agri-food sector in Europe, and corporate accountability in the extractive sectors in the Democratic Republic of Congo. Her current research deepens this trajectory by exploring the role of corporate human rights responsibilities in the context of just transition. She is particularly engaged in developing participatory and inclusive methodologies—including arts-based approaches—to meaningfully involve affected communities and non-human stakeholders.

Samenta has published widely on these issues, including the award-winning article: ‘*Migrant Workers’ Rights-Talk in the British Hospitality Sector*’ (*Business and Human Rights Journal*, 2019) and ‘*Business and Human Rights as Sensemaking: A Multi-Level Framework for Organizational Translation*’ (*Business & Society*, 2024). She is also Book Review Editor and co-editor of a special issue on *Business, Human Rights, and Just Transition in the Energy and Extractive Sectors* in the *Business and Human Rights Journal*.

Samenta is co-director of the Teaching Business and Human Rights Forum. As an educator, she brings a critical, practice-informed and systemic perspective into the classroom, designing and delivering Business and Human Rights courses for students of management, law, and politics, as well as MBAs, social auditors, financiers, and human rights defenders across diverse institutional and regional settings.

Director of OECD Watch

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Marian specialises in strengthening international standards and laws on responsible business conduct, as well as helping individuals and communities achieve remedy for corporate human rights and environmental harms.

Marian directs the OECD Watch network. She plans and undertakes the network's strategic and logistical activities. She advises complaints to National Contact Points and appeals to the OECD Investment Committee. 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She is international legal scholar specializing in international and European Union law, human rights law in particular, for more than two decades. She is currently a member of the UN Working Group on Business and Human Rights for Central and Eastern Europe and Balkan states. Since 2005, she has pioneered on business engagement in human rights issues in the Central and Eastern European region, fostered development of business networks and guidance and advised on development of national actions plans in this area, and co-initiated social labelling initiatives. She has lectured on human rights and new technologies, AI in particular, in various contexts and has recently issued a [report on business, human rights and AI](#) on behalf of the UNWG for the UN Human Rights Council.

Ms. Jakulevičienė has served as a member of the Management and Executive Boards of the EU Fundamental Rights Agency and the European Commission against Racism and Intolerance, and a co-arbitrator at the OSCE Court of Conciliation and Arbitration. From 1997 to 2013, Ms. Jakulevičienė worked in United Nations organisations in Lithuania, Sweden, Turkey and Ukraine. She is a Professor and a former Dean of the Law School (2015-2025) of Mykolas Romeris University in Lithuania.

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Ron Popper has been working on the business and human rights agenda as a practitioner and advisor in multinational companies for more than 20 years. He is currently Chief Executive Officer of the Global Business Initiative on Human Rights, which groups 20 multinationals, and a former member of a number of Boards, including that of the Institute for Human Rights and Business.

Ron spent 10 years as Head of Corporate Responsibility for the Switzerland-based multinational ABB where he focused on managing high-risk projects in different parts of the world, stakeholder engagement, and developing human rights policies and processes. He also developed and led a global human rights training program.

He is a regular lecturer teaching business and human rights courses at universities in Switzerland, Finland, Norway, Italy and the United Kingdom. He also engages in consultancy work on business and human rights, communications and crisis management.

As a former journalist (26 years in newspapers and radio), he closely follows current affairs and diplomatic relations, particularly in Europe, the Middle East and parts of Asia. He has travelled widely to many parts of the world, including conflict zones.



Andrea Shemberg

Business and Human Rights Advisor

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She is a common law and international human rights lawyer with more than 20 years of experience in business and human rights. From 2007 to 2011, Andrea served as Legal Advisor to the UN Secretary-General's Special Representative on Business and Human Rights, John Ruggie (SRSR). She led the SRSR's work on investment, carrying out the joint SRSR-International Finance Corporation research on looking into how contracts underpinning major projects in developing countries integrate concern for environmental and social impacts. Andrea then led the development of the UN Principles for Responsible Contracts. Andrea was also part of the team that developed the UN Guiding Principles for Business and Human Rights (UNGPs).

After the SRSR mandate, Andrea established the Investment & Human Rights Project at the London School of Economics and from 2016 – 18 led the Iran Business Responsibility Project. She served as Senior Advisor and Chair of the Global Business Initiative on Human Rights for more than 8 years, resigning her position in January 2026.

She began her legal career as a management-side employment and labour law lawyer with a commercial law firm in the United States before completing her MSc in Human Rights at the London School of Economics and Political Science. Andrea also served as Legal Advisor to the Economic Relations team at Amnesty International UK where she co-authored the first AIUK reports on international investment agreements and human rights. Andrea also established the first Economic Relations team at the International Commission of Jurists in Geneva.

Andrea currently teaches business and human rights, and works as a business and human rights advisor to multinational companies, civil society organisations, governments and multilateral organisations.
